2016 – 2017 has been a most successful year for the Rotary Club of Torquay. We have completed or been involved in more than 16 planned projects and programmes, raised over \$45,000 to allow us to continue doing good in the world, and had hands-on involvement in our local community in numerous ways. Certainly Rotary Serving Humanity in action

There have been many highlights for me, not least the installation and unveiling of our four fitness stations on the Torquay foreshore and our Annual Motor Show. Our financial support for the Rotary Foundation, as we celebrate its centenary in 2017 and gets oh so close to the eradication of Polio, continues.

THE ROTARY FOUNDATION

In 2016 – 2017 The Rotary Foundation celebrates 100 years of “Doing Good in the World” as part of the Foundation’s mission to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace. This year is an opportunity for Rotarians and Rotary Clubs to not only celebrate the achievements of

The Rotary Foundation (TRF) but plan for the future.

It is also an opportunity for Rotarians to share these achievements with our communities and make them aware of the vital work of Rotary International and The Rotary



In 2016 – 2017 the Rotary Club of Torquay has contributed \$3,700.00 or \$100.00 per club member to the Annual Programs Fund as part of our ongoing support.

In addition a grant of \$1,900.00 has been made to the End Polio Now fund. This includes donations to the Ride the Bellarine event.

In October 2016 the Club TRF Chair attended the District Foundation Grants Seminar in Ararat to enable the Club to be qualified to apply for Foundation grants.

Also in October 2016 the Club approved a donation of AUD1000.00 to the Cambodia Fresh Water program facilitated by Rtn Bryan Humphrey from the Rotary Club of Geelong East. This is part of a Global Grant Project with 23 Clubs in the District committing a total sum in the order of \$AUD77,790.00.

On the 24th October 2016 the Club celebrated World Polio Day to highlight the need to continue the fight for the eradication of this preventable disease.

On the 19th June 2017 the Club celebrated the 100th Anniversary of the formation of The Rotary Foundation with a birthday party on our Monday meeting night and venue .We are delighted that DG Stephen Lamont and his wife Gaye were with us on that night to share in the celebrations.



To round out the year on a positive note, President Lesley has initiated an application for a District 9780 TRF District Grant Project . The application is for a grant of \$AUD3793.00 for a project entitled “Traffic controller training and equipment for the provision of critical traffic control at community and Rotary events”.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

AWAKE AND SHINE SCHOOL, SAMTHAR

AU\$5940 was provided for the purchase and installation of 2 Skyjuice water filters for the Awake and Shine school in India. The RC of Benalla are building the water tanks and supervising this project. There have been various delays to this project and the filters are currently awaiting customs clearance in India. The purpose of this project is to supply clean water to staff and children where currently the children walk to and from school for up to 1½ hours morning and afternoon but only have approximately 300 ml. of water to drink.



CLEAN WATER IN CAMBODIA

Our club contributed \$1000 to Global Grant 1745092. This grant was initiated by Bryan Humphrey, Rotary Club of Geelong East, and supported by many clubs in our district. \$US58,489 was approved to provide 12 water wells with pumps, 5 rain water collection systems and one bio-sand filter system.

ROTARY AID FOLLOWING DEVASTATION IN HAITI

In Oct 2016 hurricane Matthew hit Haiti leaving 1.4 million people in need of humanitarian aid. Our club responded to the Rotary request for action by donating \$1000 to Shelterbox.
